

### AAUW enjoys the Saratoga Blossom Festival



Again this year our branch hosted an information table at the Blossom Festival on March 19, produced by the Saratoga Historical Foundation to celebrate the beauty of the orchards and the good life they provided. Taking place in the Heritage Orchard next to the Saratoga Library, the Festival originated in 1900 and commemorates and preserves the

memory of Saratoga's agricultural and community-focused life.

We handed out brochures for our three local programs – Local Scholarships, Tech Trek and the Committee on Homeless Women and Children – and general information about AAUW.

Saratoga Mayor Howard Wilson stopped at our table to thank us for all we do in the local community. Dozens of other community organizations are involved with the Blossom Festival which provides a beautiful setting in which to talk with the thousands of people of all ages who attend the event.

AAUW member **Kay Duffy** was one of many local artists who exhibited their work at the Festival. There were antique automobiles and machinery from decades long past on display, talks about local history, and many musical groups, one of which performed near our table amid the flowering apple trees. Even the weather cooperated and gave us bright sunshine! Our thanks to **Gail Pedersen** who staffed the table for several hours and provided membership materials and extra copies of the *Grapevine*; and to **Sumi Tanabe** who also staffed the table for several hours. **Virginia Turner** was our liaison with the Historical Foundation.

## Meet the Branch Leadership Team

**Sumi Taniguchi Tanabe** is the Local Scholarship Co-Chair. Born in Long Beach, CA, on Columbus Day, 1937, her family worked hard to make a living out of the harsh soil along with six other Japanese American families. Just when things were getting better, Pearl Harbor happened. The FBI agent told her father that he had less than two weeks to pack what they could carry. He learned later about Executive Order 9066 signed by President Roosevelt to send all Japanese, citizens or not, to ten internment camps. The Taniguchis asked to be sent to the Fresno Assembly Center so that all the siblings and parents could be together. They lived in the horses' stalls, and Sumi still remembers the stench. Later, they arrived in Jerome, Arkansas, where her sister was born. Afterwards they were moved to another internment camp on the Indian reservation in Gila, Arizona. Sumi learned years later, it was because the government was bringing in German POWs to Jerome. When the war

ended, the Taniguchis lost everything in Long Beach and came to Fowler, a small town near Fresno. Two siblings were added to the family. Many years later Sumi worked diligently for redress and reparations so that no other groups of people would be imprisoned based solely on race and wartime hysteria.

Sumi attended schools in Fowler, and received her A.S. from Fresno City College. Her father told her that money for college education had to go to her brothers. She finally received her B.S. from the University of San Francisco. She married Art Tanabe in 1964. Sumi spent the majority of her life working at all the CA public higher education including community colleges, state colleges and the U.C. system. She worked for 29 years at West Valley, the Chancellor's Office and Mission College. She was one of the first employees of Mission College, and she retired in 2002. She was involved with many boards including national ones where she was the only woman. She was the first



woman president of the SJ Buddhist Church, Fuji Towers (*housing for low income seniors*) and president of FBWA, national organization for Buddhist women. Volunteer work was a way of life for her as she participated in Stanford Hospital Spiritual Care program and other non-profits. Urged by Sharon Kelkenberg, she joined AAUW in 2002 and has been actively involved with the Homeless Committee, Local Scholarship, Legal Advocacy and Great Decisions. Widowed in 2012, she has three daughters living in Maryland, Berkeley and Campbell. She adores her grandson in Maryland and granddaughter in Campbell.

## Meet the Branch Leadership Team

**Marilyn Fuller.** As a Northern California native, I developed early a love of the Spanish language. After graduation from Tamalpais HS in Mill Valley I went on to earn my BAs in Spanish and Psychology from UC Berkeley. One highlight of my university experience was my junior year in the UC Education Abroad Program, living and studying in Spanish, in Madrid, Spain. After graduation here, I went back to teach English at Berlitz in Madrid for a year, before returning to earn my teaching credentials at UC Santa Barbara. My teaching career, as an elementary and middle school bilingual teacher took me from Santa Maria School District, to Alum Rock in San Jose, and then Campbell. Now retired, I miss interacting with students, so I volunteer in a weekly middle school STEM Maker Space.

My husband, Dave, and I enjoy life in the house we built in the Santa Cruz Mountains, but we also like traveling, and spending time with our friends and family. In my free time I enjoy reading, hiking, knitting, crocheting, and rubber stamping.

As a co-chair of the Local Scholarship Committee, I am committed to helping worthy young women fulfill their educational goals. I also believe strongly in Fair Trade, to help raise the living conditions of people around the world, including giving educational opportunities to their daughters, so I have been active on the team of volunteers who make possible the annual International Gift Faire ([internationalgiftfaire.com](http://internationalgiftfaire.com)) each October in San Jose.

## Los Gatos-Saratoga AAUW: The 2010s

We pioneered another form of organization early in the decade with rotating *Chairwomen of the Month* where various committees took responsibility for the Board meeting agenda and monthly programs. A comprehensive guide was developed which we then shared with other AAUW branches that had difficulty filling all their leadership positions.

**Lavonne Marafino and Gail Pedersen** began collecting recipes for our own AAUW cookbook – *Beginnings and Endings*. It includes members shared appetizers and desserts recipes.

We enjoyed programs about West Valley College, women's strategic role in addressing global issues, and women's ways of leading. We learned about the Los Gatos and Saratoga Railway, an electric inter-urban railroad built at the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and we heard Larry Gerston discuss his book *Restoring the Luster to the Once Golden State*. When the America's Cup sailing race came to San Francisco we were well prepared, and we recognized the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address. We got an update on research relating to Alzheimer's disease and heard about efforts to exonerate those wrongfully con-



victed of a serious crime.

When the AAUW California convention was held in Santa Clara in 2012, our branch provided several volunteers to act as greeters. The Homeless Committee, having held the English Tea for 23 years, decided to try a spring garden party in 2012, but with disappointing results decided to reinvigorate the English Tea in 2013 and then celebrated the 25<sup>th</sup> "Silver" English Tea in 2014.

Our Tech Trek girls inspired us all with their enthusiastic response to their week of math and science camp at Stanford University. Local scholarship recipients represented varied countries of origin — Mexico, Iran, Vietnam, the former Soviet Union—and an equally wide range of majors – physics, mechanical engineering, molecular biology and mathematics. AAUW certainly supports women in the science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) fields through our local, statewide and national efforts.
