Keep Our Workers, Our Families, and Our Nation Healthy

Across the nation, preparations are underway this fall for what could be a busy flu season. Doctor’s offices and pharmacies have started administering seasonal flu vaccines. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently approved the use of one dose of the “H1N1 flu” vaccine, expected to be available soon, for people over the age of 10.

The issue of “keeping the nation healthy and fit” has become increasingly more important. The

Healthy Families Act (H.R. 2460/S. 1152) would provide fulltime employees with seven paid sick days a year to be used for their own medical needs or to tend to the medical needs of children and other family members. It would also allow workers to use paid sick time to recover from or seek assistance related to an incidence of domestic violence, stalking, or sexual assault. Part-time employees would receive a prorated share of paid sick days. Paid sick days are a public health

issue. In these tough economic times, however, the decision to stay home without pay is a very difficult one. Without the enactment of the Healthy Families Act, it is also a decision that too many American workers may be forced to make this flu season.

Urge your representative to co-sponsor the Healthy Families Act to ensure American workers are able to care for themselves and their families during illnesses.

Lemon Cheese Delight

Serves: 12

First Layer:

- 1 cup flour
- 1 stick butter
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Cut butter into flour; add nuts and bake at 350° F. for 20 minutes in an 11 1/2 x 7 1/2 Pyrex dish. Cool.

Second Layer:

- 1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese
- 1 cup Cool Whip
- 1 cup sifted powdered sugar

Mix and spread over the first layer.

- 1 (6oz.) pkg. lemon pie filling or 1 (16 oz.) can of lemon pie filling

Attend Great Decisions – 2010

We frequently hear the phrase “In a Global World”... in the media, political speeches, and business presentations. Access to a global community through the internet have brought the world to our doorsteps. “The work of the Foreign Policy Association (FPA) is vitally important in educating Americans on current policy issues and expanding public participation in the foreign policy process.” Colin Powell, former US Secretary of State, made this statement at the FPA 2003 Annual Dinner.

The complexity and multiplicity of the foreign policy questions facing us make it difficult to investigate and learn on our own. Join us in learning and discussing some of the vital foreign policy questions facing the U.S. today at the Great Decisions – 2010 program, created by the FPA.

This program is sponsored locally by:

- the League of Women Voters (LWV),
- the American Association of University Women (AAUW),
- the Saratoga Area Senior Coordinating Council (SASCC), and
- the Saratoga Retirement Community (SRC)

It's Now Enrollment Time

The good news is that the enrollment fees will remain the same as last year. Again the cost will be \$25 for individual participants and \$35 for couples who share course materials. Be aware, be informed — be there! Sign up for the program. The deadline for signing up is November 30.

You will learn about all of the following eight topics during the eight session of the 2010 program.

1. **Special Envoys** – Special envoys can help bring attention and diplomatic muscle to resolve conflicts and global challenges but they also bring with them their own “special” problems.
2. **Preventing Genocide** – Post-election rioting in Kenya in December 2007 brought pressure on Nairobi, from international and regional diplomats, to end tensions and avert bloodshed on a massive scale.
3. **Global Crime** – From the booming sex trade in Eastern Europe, to online fraud syndicates in Africa and the drug cartels of Asia and Central America, crime has become more organized and globalized.
4. **U.S.–China Security Relations** – China’s influence is growing regionally and internationally, along with its military expenditures.
5. **Global Financial Crisis** – The global financial crisis that began in late 2007 revealed major deficiencies in the regulation of markets and institutions – all

of which came perilously close to collapse. Emergency measures to prevent a full collapse of the global financial system have led to mixed results.

6. **Russia and its Neighbors** – Russia’s policy of maintaining a “sphere of influence” in former Soviet satellites has been challenged in recent years by movements against pro-Russia regimes.
7. **The Persian Gulf** – Now more than ever, the Persian Gulf region offers many difficult challenges to U.S. policymakers.
8. **Peacebuilding and Conflict Resolution** – U.S. campaigns in Iraq and Afghanistan have shown that military force alone cannot ensure peace in all conflicts.
