


Directories can be picked-up at the:

Leadership Team Message



Welcome to an exciting year for Los Gatos-Saratoga AAUW – **it's our 75th anniversary!** Throughout the year this column will highlight some branch activities, decade by decade, and refer to what was going on around us during that time. Our thanks to **Nancy Anderson** for providing the branch history.

We have a different **leadership** look this year, one which is not altogether new. Our positions of president and president-elect are vacant and we will be relying on a team of leaders to steer the branch during 2015-2016. A few years ago, in a similar situation, we operated quite successfully with a different Chairwoman for each month, so we know we have the necessary experience.

In response to the member survey we took in the spring, we are reducing the number of general **monthly meetings** slightly, from 9 meetings to 6. Some of those meetings are already set, if you want to note them in your calendar:

These are all wonderful opportunities to bring prospective members to learn more about AAUW.

Tech Trek Celebrates 18th Year at Stanford

This summer marked the eighteenth consecutive year that the AAUW **Tech Trek** Science and Math Camps were held at Stanford University. Our branch was pleased to sponsor six girls to participate in Camp Grace Hopper during the week of July 5, 2015. The girls arrived at camp on Sunday eager, and a little anxious. They left the following Saturday very tired, but clearly excited and inspired.

Many of you know from personal experience that the path for women interested in **STEM** fields has long felt as if it runs uphill. Sadly, the latest AAUW research report "*Solving The Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing*" tells us that this is still too often true. **Tech Trek** is an important effort to encourage middle school girls with a natural love of math and science to persevere. This year the camp curriculum expanded to include computer programming and security in an effort to address the reluctance of girls to enter this field.

Every day is packed with core classes, experiments, field trips, and activities from which the campers learn specific math and science lessons. Being on a college campus gives many of the girls their first chance to imagine what it will be like for them to go to college. And being surrounded by other girls who are excited about math and science helps many of the campers realize that it is great to be a **STEM**-girl.

Here are just a few things that the girls sponsored by our branch had to say about their experience:

- *Some of the most wonderful experiences I've ever had happened here at camp.*
- *Thank you so much for inviting me to go out of my comfort zones and expand my academic potential at this wonderful camp.*
- *Learning more about engineering really inspired me to try new things and ask questions.*
- *Thank you for allowing me to go to a camp where almost everyone likes science or math and for helping me learn more about the career options in science.*
- One girl summed it up the best as "*This is the best science and math camp ever, Tech Trek rocks.*"

A number of our branch members helped to make this amazing experience possible for these girls. Many of you donated much-needed funding. Others worked behind the scenes selecting the campers and dealing with all the administrative details required to run a summer program. And a few gave up an entire week of their time to spend with the girls, making the experience one that will have a lifelong impact. Thank you!

The Homeless Committee Celebrates its 30th Year

Now in its 30th year – that’s right, 30th year – our AAUW Branch’s Committee on Homeless Women & Children (a.k.a. “*the Homeless Committee*”) continues its hard work. For a number of years the Committee has been chaired by a most-dedicated Pat Khan. Sadly, Pat has developed some health problems and is taking a break. Nancy Anderson has generously agreed to take over the reins as chair for this year.

The Homeless Committee raises money to provide services and assistance for homeless women and children; we also provide direct assistance and support, such as our annual holiday party and gift giving. We will try to include an article in each issue of the *Grapevine* to let you know what we are doing and what you can do to help. There are lots of opportunities, big and small, to help.

We had our annual fundraiser, an English Tea, at the end of April 2015. Thank you to all who attended and worked so hard to make the event memorable and profitable. Every time we consider ending the Tea fundraiser, we realize how many things it allows us to do for homeless women and children. And so we are once again hard at work planning 2016’s English Tea in the spring.

Sadly, the **Georgia Travis Center**, named after our Committee’s founder, which provided many services for homeless women and children has permanently closed. So now much of our energy and resources are going to a fledgling drop-in center for homeless

women, **The Women’s Gathering Place (WGP)**. Homeless women who spend the night in a shelter are required to leave early in the morning. These women often have no place to go; they ride the bus all day or spend their day in the park or on the sidewalk. The **WGP** provides a place of safety and community for some of them.

The Homeless Committee has contributed a refrigerator and a dishwasher to support the lunch program at **WGP**. We also provide a meal for some 25 women once a month.

So easy to do; so much appreciated. We serve lunch at the monthly birthday celebration so we bring a birthday cake and balloons. What a special treat! How about signing up to make a pasta salad or pot of soup for 25? This is easy to do and so appreciated; so gratifying.
